MEMBERSHIP

The Grand Knight and Financial Secretary are concerned that several members still have not paid their current dues. As a reminder to the membership, if a member ever experiences financial hardship or personal problems that prohibit him from paying his dues, don't hesitate to contact the FS or GK for assistance in working through this period. The GK has the discretion to waive dues under certain extenuating circumstances. However, if a member feels he can just withdraw from the order by not paying his dues, that creates a problem. Most members are unaware of what goes on behind the scenes. For instance:

- Supreme Council has specified the procedures we as a Council must follow before a member can be suspended for non-payment of dues. The Council must continue to pay the State and Supreme Councils a per capita amount until such time as the member either pays his dues or is suspended. (This situation drains Council resources from other Charitable works.)
- The procedures for suspension include, in addition to

sending out the courtesy reminder notice, a second notice followed by a “Knight Alert” letter followed by a Form 1845 (Notice of Intent to Suspend). Personal contact must be made by the GK, FS or a Trustee of the Council before the State or Supreme will allow a suspension.

- Upon receipt of the Form 1845, the District Deputy, State Deputy and the Supreme Knights Office will call the member.

As you can see, a lot is involved in leaving the Knights. When you were approached to join the Knights, something appealed to you that caused you to make the decision to fill out that Form 100 and take your first step to Knighthood, the 1st Degree. If something has caused you to have second thoughts, please contact either the GK or the member who brought you to the Order and express your concerns. We want you to stay with us as a Brother Knight. However, if you are resigned to leaving the Knights, consider giving yourself time to reconsider by applying for a “withdrawal card” which will allow you to join any Council at anytime in the future with no penalty or back dues.

SHARE – The “Self Help and Resource Exchange (SHARE)” of the Washington Capital Area celebrated is a not-for-profit, private organization that builds and strengthens community through volunteer service. SHARE offers savings on food and there are no income requirements. One SHARE unit costs \$15.50 in cash plus two hours of volunteer community service. This service can be any type of unpaid assistance given to neighbors, organizations, etc. It may also be done at the SHARE site.

Bishop McNamara Council No. 1622 sponsors a monthly “SHARE” food co-operative distribution site. The site, located at 300 E. Patrick Street (the old McHenry Auto Repair building), located southeast corner of the junction of E. Patrick Street and East Street in Frederick, is open from 9:00 am to 10:00 am, on the morning of 4th Saturday of each month. Volunteers start packaging food at 8:30 am. Upcoming SHARE 2003 Dates: Sept. 27, Oct. 25, Nov. 22, Dec. 20 and Jan. 24.

COLUMBIAN SQUIRES

WHAT? The "Bishop McNamara Council's Columbian Squires Circle". The Circle was approved for reinstatement last Fraternal Year and it is understood that several young men are interested. What is the Columbian Squires?? They are the youth arm of the Knights of Columbus. The Squires were founded by Brother Barnabas McDonald of the Christian Brothers in 1925 in the United States. The first Canadian Circle was established in 1926. The Columbian Squires develop young men as Catholic leaders and to provide learning and social programs. The squires are encouraged to participate in family, church and community service activities just like the Knights.

Presently there are over 4,500 circles with a membership of over 300,000 young Catholic men. The circles are operated by the young men under the direction of the Knights of Columbus. Although, our Circle will operate as the Bishop McNamara Council Squires Circle, it is open to any young men from Districts 3 or 25 if they choose. Knights are required by each Council that participates, to work as counselors for the young men. Activities for the squires include monthly meetings, field trips, sports activities and educational opportunities in service work and community participation.

PRO-LIFE INFORMATION

The case of Laci and Conner Peterson continues to spark intense debate in advance of Congress considering legislation to allow criminals to be prosecuted for killing or injuring an unborn child following an assault on a mother during the commission of a federal crime. Pro-life laws similar to the federal bill already are on the books in more than half the states, and pro-life groups are working to protect women in the others with newly proposed bills. In Washington, President Bush has pledged to sign the Unborn Victims of Violence Act, which sponsors have nicknamed "Laci and Conner's Law" in honor of Laci Peterson and her unborn son. Laci's husband, Scott Peterson, has been charged with double murder by prosecutors in California, which has an unborn victims law. The case has prompted a verbal battle between pro-life groups and abortion advocates who oppose such laws protecting pregnant women and their children. "In the Peterson case, I've heard no one go on radio or TV and say there shouldn't be an indictment for the death of that child," said pro-life Sen. Mike DeWine (R-OH), the act's chief Senate sponsor. "The fact is there are two victims -- it's fiction to say there aren't." Pro-abortion groups oppose the bill because they are alarmed that Congress might, for the first time, recognize an unborn child as a person from the moment of conception -- as the bill does.

"This is one of their strategies -- to ascribe legal rights to the fetus separate from the woman," said Kate Michelman, president of NARAL Pro-Choice America. "Their intent is to do whatever they can to contribute to the ultimate goal of overturning Roe v. Wade and taking away a woman's right to control her reproductive life." The latest version of the bill has been endorsed by Laci Peterson's parents and siblings. In a letter to sponsors this month, they said the measure "is very close to our hearts." Critics of the bill are upset that its sponsors so readily embraced the link to the high-profile murder case. Renaming the bill for Laci and Conner "is shameless exploitation of a horrific tragedy," Michelman said. "It sickens me." To help promote the bill, the National Right to Life Committee has launched a new ad campaign revolving around a similar case. In addition to citing the Laci and Conner Peterson murders, the National Right to Life Committee's ad campaign uses the photo of a mother at a funeral cradling the dead body of her son who had died in the womb when the mother was beaten. According to the mother in the photo, Tracy Marciniak, law enforcement authorities in Milwaukee, Wis., told her, "Nobody died in the attack." Marciniak's testimony is included in the print ad, which began running May 14. "When I was hospitalized and grieving for my dead baby, law enforcement authorities told my family that they could charge the man who attacked only with assault," Marciniak stated in the ad. "I was devastated." Marciniak's husband attacked her in Milwaukee in 1992, when her son, Zachariah, was four days away from his birth due date. The husband, Glendale Black, was convicted of beating his wife, but there was no law to punish him for the death of his unborn

son.

In 1998, Wisconsin lawmakers approved legislation treating such instances as two crimes - not one. The bill is similar to the Unborn Victims of Violence Act proposed in Congress.

"Thank God California has such a law," Marciniak said. "That's why prosecutors were able to file a double homicide charge in the brutal murders of Laci Peterson and her unborn son, Conner. They didn't have to tell surviving family members that legally, Conner had never lived and never died."

From the other coast, the New York State Catholic Conference commends the State Senate for passing the Unborn Victims of Violence Act (S.403), and now calls on Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver to put aside the politics of abortion and allow a floor vote in his This legislation states that when an unborn child is killed or injured during the commission of a violent crime against the child's mother, then the assailant can be charged for crimes against the mother and the child. Currently in New York law, under such a scenario, the assailant can only be charged with the attack on the mother.

The need for such legislation was made tragically clear with the recent murder of Laci Peterson and her unborn son, Conner. After police arrested her husband, Scott Peterson, prosecutors were able to bring two murder counts against him because California has an Unborn Victims of Violence law. Had this crime occurred in New York State, only a single murder count could be filed.

"Studies reveal that women are at a higher risk of domestic violence when they are pregnant. By passing this legislation, the Senate is attempting to correct a serious injustice in our criminal justice system," said Kathleen Gallagher, director of pro-life activities.

"When a woman who has chosen to bring her baby to term has that choice seized from her by an outside aggressor, then justice must be served. In such cases, there are clearly two victims - the mother and the unborn child. We applaud the prime sponsor of the bill, Senator Serphin Maltese (R-Queens), for his determination in pursuing this legislation, as well as Senate Majority Leader Joseph Bruno for his leadership in bringing the bill to the floor."

"The opposition of abortion rights advocates to this legislation is inexplicable and contrary to the position of the overwhelming majority of the nation. This law would not affect abortion policies at all. In fact, it specifically excludes legal abortions. We call on the Assembly to stand with the majority of Americans and pass this bill. By doing so, they will honor the memory of Laci and Conner Peterson, as well as all women and their babies who have been the victims of violence."

As Knights, we need to contact our state legislators and encourage them to enact like legislation here in the State of Maryland. It will be a difficult uphill battle as we, the State of Maryland, are one of the leading states that has chosen to murder the defenseless little children.

Pope John Paul II Receives Knights In Audience
10/9/2003

Pope John Paul II received the officers and board of directors of the Knights of Columbus in an audience Oct. 9, one week before the 25th anniversary of his election. Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson presented the pope with a gift of \$2.5 million, calling it "an offering to support your

work of peace, reconciliation and charity."

The \$2.5 million represented the annual earnings from the Order's Vicarius Christi Fund. Since its establishment in 1981, the \$20 million fund has earned for the pope and his personal charities more than \$35 million.

The pope thanked the Knights of Columbus for its support and prayers. He called the Vicarius Christi Fund "a sign of the solidarity of the Knights of Columbus with the Successor of Peter in his concern for the universal Church."

The pope also acknowledged "the daily prayers, sacrifices and apostolic works of so many Knights in their local councils, their parishes and their communities."

During the audience Supreme Knight Anderson thanked the pope for his "courageous and steadfast witness to the power of the risen Lord." Through his pontificate, Anderson continued, "the doors of many human hearts and of many nations have opened wide to Christ."

The pope urged the Knights to remain faithful to the vision of its founder, Father Michael J. McGivney. "May you continue to seek new ways of being a leaven of the Gospel in the world and a spiritual force for the renewal of the Church in holiness, unity and truth," he said. The cause for canonization of Father McGivney is being investigated by the Vatican.

Celebrations surrounding the pope's 25th anniversary, including the beatification of Mother Teresa on Oct. 19, were telecast via satellite to a worldwide audience with funding from the Knights.

Knights of Columbus Leader Calls Abortion 'A Stain on Our Nation'

"30 years after Roe v. Wade, abortion is a choice 'no society should tolerate.'"

New Haven — The following statement was issued by Knights of Columbus Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, regarding the 30th year of the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade abortion decision:

"This year, on Jan. 22, we note with great sadness, but greater determination, the 30th year of legalized abortion on demand in the United States.

"For 30 years, abortion has been a stain on our nation; a deep wound in our nation's soul. Abortion is the negation of our nation's commitment to human rights and the equal dignity of every individual. It is a tragedy that sets women against their own children. This is a choice no woman should ever have to make. This is a choice no society should tolerate.

"Our society can, and must, do better to address the needs of women, rather than leaving them and their children to the violence of abortion. Young people, especially, understand this. Abortion holds less and less appeal for the generation raised under Roe v. Wade. More and more young people identify themselves as pro-life and they are renewing the ranks of the pro-life movement. The abortion rate is at its lowest since the decision was first handed down, due to the decline in abortion among younger women. Young people who grew up under Roe v. Wade have seen the damage wrought by abortion and they demand better."

"As we note this 30th year of abortion on demand, we are confident of the day when we will instead celebrate its end, when the law will no longer protect the violence of abortion, but will instead protect the lives and dignity of both women and their unborn children."

With more than 1.6 million members throughout North America and elsewhere, the Knights is the world's largest Catholic family fraternal service organization. In 2001 members reported raising and contributing to charity a record \$125 million and volunteering a record 58.9 million hours of service. Included in that figure is approximately \$3.8 million raised and distributed to pro-life groups.

God hears our prayers for help and he listens to the powerful intercession of his friends, the saints. Let us learn to invoke the intercession of his holy, humble and very human parish priest for our conversion and growth in the spiritual life.

All Brother Knights are constantly reminded that Charity is the first principle of our order. And, as such we should be mindful of what Father McGivney means to us as our Founder and for all of the good work he accomplished for the Church and poor over a century ago.
